



- **REQUIRED FIELDS*** When you see a red asterisk it means that an answer is required.
- LAST NAME Entering both last names on the same line is fine. But, please remember how you enter your name as you will need to enter it the same way when you apply for degree-seeking.
- TELEPHONE NUMBERS +52 plus cell number
- **POSTAL CODE** Use Google to find your home postal code. City of Mexico and postal code are needed, not your district.
- **EMAIL ADDRESS** you can use your personal or UVM email, but remember which one you choose since you will need to enter the same one when you apply for degree seeking
- TERM you are applying for Fall 2025.
- **SIGNATURE** type your name, no electronic "signature" needed.

Course Sequence

Semester by Semester



Year One

Fall 2025 (Late Aug. - Early Dec.) ENGL 106 Sept 8 – Dec 12

Spring 2026 (Early Jan. - Early May) ENGL 107

Summer 2026 (Anytime between May-Aug.) ENGL 108



Year Two

Fall 2026 (Late Aug. - Early Dec.)
HPS 178 – Personal Health & Wellness

Introduces and analyzes basic personal and community health problems, with emphasis on current scientific information essential to health promotion and maintenance of individual health

HPS 433 – Global Health

Examines major health problems of underdeveloped, developed and emerging nations. Students conduct in-depth analyses of health problems among various populations in multicultural settings, both nationally and internationally.

Spring 2027 (Early Jan. - Early May)
HPS 350 – Principles of Health Education and
Health Promotion

This course introduces the student to the discipline and profession of health education. Students will examine the concepts of health and wellness, the determinants of health behavior, national health status, the history of health education and health promotion.

BIOS 376 – Introduction to Biostatistics

This course introduces biostatistical methods and applications, covering descriptive statistics, probability, and inferential techniques necessary for appropriate analysis and interpretation of data relevant to health sciences.

Summer 2027 (Anytime between May-Aug.) GHI 440 – Intercultural Communication for Health Science

This course will take a comparative perspective to analyze and evaluate diverse health care systems. Students will compare and contrast challenges and characteristics across global settings and their impact in delivery of healthcare including public health interventions



Year Three

Fall 2027 (Late Aug. - Early Dec.)

HPS 417 – Health Systems in Global Health

This course explores the role of health systems in achieving global health goals. Case studies will be used to examine how health systems are designed to achieve different goals.

HPS 405 – Biology in Public Health

This course introduces non-biologists to human disease and its impact on the individual and the public health.

Spring 2028 (Early Jan. - Early May)

HPS 404 – Fundamentals of Evaluation

This course will prepare the public health professional to understand and prepare basic evaluation tasks.

HPS 409 – Global Water, Sanitation and Hygiene

The course is designed to provide the students an understanding of Global WaSH. The course will examine the historic background, health impact and global burden of diseases related to WaSH.

Summer 2028 (Anytime between May-Aug.) HPS 493A – Field Work in Public Health

The internship is the Mel and Enid Zuckerman College of Public Health's required engagement experience for public health majors. These public health-focused, field-based experiences give Public Health undergraduate students opportunities to incorporate classroom learning into public health practice in preparation for future work in the field.

Important Information

- UA taught courses will follow U of A academic calendar
 - Fall Semester: Late August Early December
 - 7week 1 Late August Early October
 - 7week 2 Mid October Early December
 - Spring Semester: Late January Early May
 - 7week 1 Late January Early March
 - 7week 2 Mid March Early May
- Students need 120 credits to graduate from UA, about 35% will be taught by UA,
 65% transferred from UVM program
